Lammastide is an opportunity to give thanks and to consider what Jesus meant when he said: 'I am the bread of life and whoever comes to me will never be hungry and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty'. Jesus' promise when he says: 'I am the bread of life', is to fill our hearts with his love and to reassure us that we can rely on him loving us just as we are.

With the torrential thunder storms in August, our plants need to help by dead-heading and feeding with tomato fertiliser to keep them flowering until the frosts. Shrubs can be trimmed. Our summer flowering bulbs will be good next year if we take off the flowers and seedpods but leave stems and leaves to feed the bulbs as they die off. A feed of fertiliser will also help. We can think of planting bulbs for Christmas presents this month including paper-white narcissi and prepared hyacinths. As beans get over, brassicas and leaks can be given attention and made ready for the autumn.

Teddy Bears at Wickhampton

There was a wonderful Teddy Bears Leap at Wickhampton Church on Sunday 13th August. On a warm day with light winds, over 100 teddies (and other assorted furry cuddlies) bravely parachuted down from the 66ft church tower to cheers and encouragement from the families watching below. The parachutes were made by Suzanne Burman of Wickhampton, who ingeniously stripped out the mechanisms from old or cheap umbrellas and used the fabric which was then attached by Velcro and paperclips to each toy. The teddies were hoisted in a basket to the top of the tower by Peter Ledward, and as each one was prepared for the jump, our Master of Ceremonies Bob Ottaway down below announced its name and owner. Then, with a dramatic 3-2-1 countdown from everyone, the teddy was launched into space and descended, more or less gracefully, to the ground.

There were some complications. Some teddies were very light, and drifted in the gentle breeze to unpredictable destinations – the church roof, a cherry tree by the porch door, the telephone wire, a large nettle patch or the edge of the wheat field. Others were large, came down fast and landed hard. One of the biggest was Grumpy Gorilla, owned by Neil Nicholls of Wickhampton. We gave him two parachutes to ensure his safe arrival, but he still needed the attention of our young first aid team before restoring him to Neil. Even bigger was an enormous rabbit, who travelled up on his own in the basket and was kitted out with three parachutes. Sadly they got twisted round one another and failed to open. He plunged to the ground, but the gallant first aid team still managed to pull him through. The oldest bear was Bink, who showed that at 67 he was still young at heart. Bink has had one careful owner - Kati Cowen of Reedham. Whenever a bear got stuck, it was Suzanne's son Jake who got him down with a combination of athleticism, daring and a long pole.

Throughout the day, refreshments were provided by Maureen Hewitt and her team of helpers. Teas, coffees, cakes and a magnificent ploughman's lunch were in continuous demand and the team responded to the challenge. There were also numerous sideshows and a raffle to occupy the visitors while the basket was being filled and hoisted up the tower.

The event was to raise money towards an eco-toilet for Wickhampton Church, and we are very grateful to Maureen and her catering team, Suzanne (whose idea it was) with Bob and their family; also to Brenda Pawsey, Elisabeth and Peter Ledward, Revd Lorna and Peter Allies, the many cake and raffle prize donors, and other willing volunteers on the day.
