ACLE & BURE TO YARE BENEFICE

Parishes of Reedham; Freethorpe; Wickhampton; Limpenhoe, Southwood & Cantley; & Halvergate with Tunstall; together with Acle & Beighton with Moulton

From the (Acle) Rectory

There was just enough free time one afternoon at the recent Clergy Conference for me to escape the University campus and pay a visit to Hatfield House. I was intrigued by the stained glass window (1610) in the House chapel, which tells the story of the life of Christ, but without a single image of him. Instead, it depicts 12 scenes from the Old Testament, each of which links (sometimes tenuously!) to a Gospel event. So for the Annunciation, the scene is of the angels telling Abraham and Sarah that they are going to have a son. For Jesus' baptism, there is the Syrian commander Naaman dipping himself in the Jordan to be cleansed of his leprosy. The Passover lamb represents Jesus' sacrificial death; Elijah is swept up to heaven in a chariot for the Ascension.

In our Sunday services after Trinity this year, I have been enjoying engaging with a series of stories from the Old Testament read in sequence – we've met Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and Joseph and have now joined the Exodus. Such an approach respects the integrity of the Old Testament (which is also the Jewish Scriptures) more than treating it as a source of illustrations for the New. Nevertheless, for Christians, the life, death and resurrection of Christ is the fundamental story through which all other stories are to be viewed – including the story of our own life. Jesus' intimate relationship with his heavenly Father shows us that we are to know God as Our Father, too. In his ministry Jesus expressed the values of the kingdom of God: sometimes compassionate, sometimes challenging; building a community of faith. He bore persecution and suffering with love and trust, inviting us to do the same. And he shows us unbounded new life on the other side of his victory over death and sin.

In his Acts of the Apostles, St. Luke tells the story of the emerging Church in the light of the story told in his Gospel. The Holy Spirit descends on different groups of believers, as it had on Jesus after his baptism. There are stories of healing, relating to Jesus' ministry. The Church is persecuted, as was Jesus: the stoning of Stephen mirrors Jesus' crucifixion. The deliverances from prison and Paul's survival of shipwreck are experiences of resurrection.

I wonder what scenes would feature if we were to construct a window of the life of Christ out of the stories of our own life, or the life of our world?

Remembrance Sunday, 12th November, will be marked across the Benefice as usual. Acts of Remembrance will be held at the War Memorials at Reedham and Halvergate (gather at 10.45am) and Moulton St. Mary (12.30pm); that at Halvergate (incorporating Freethorpe and Wickhampton) continues with a service in the Church. Afternoon church are at Acle and Limpenhoe (both 3.00pm).

At St. Edmund's the Acle Churches Together Service of Remembrance will again include brief biographical information on local men who died in the First World War, courtesy of information contained in Chris Basey's "Not Just Names in Stone". This year will feature the eight who died in 1918, the last year of the war. These include two members of the Post Office Laight family; and the following intriguing young man, Harry Alfred Richard Crickmore:-Known to his family on The Hill as Richard, his service records refer to him as Harry. In 1911 he was the Boy Scout who was saved from drowning by Gus Anderson (who tragically died in the attempt and is commemorated on the church tower door). Harry's grave is close to the main church door and records his age at his death in April 1918 to be 19, which is inconsistent with the age of almost 18 given at his enlistment in August 1914. He was promoted to Lance Corporal for a time, but died a Private. Whether this was in part due to the reprimands he received in 1917 for being absent at Yarmouth and then Lowestoft we don't know. But we mustn't let these peculiarities obscure his record. The reason he was in this country in 1917 was a gunshot wound to the head which he received in France in July 1916, after sailing from Folkestone in December the previous year. By December

1917 he had recovered sufficiently to return to France. He was wounded again in April 1918 and brought back to a Sheffield Hospital. One of his wounds developed gas gangrene, resulting in his death.

Reedham Gardening Club

With Winter bedding plants and bulbs mostly sown, there is still time to plant tulips. Many shrubs, such as roses, can be cut back by half to minimise wind damage and then tidied up in the Spring. Cuttings, tender fuchsias and geraniums (pelargoniums) etc. need a frost-free home for the winter. As leaves fall, it is better to rake them up and put in the compost bin to avoid damaging lawns and ponds.

As vegetables are lifted and Autumn crops enjoyed, we can prepare the soil for the Spring. Broad beans can be sown, which will avoid blackfly next Summer. Apples can be carefully stored in a frost-free shed – making sure they don't contact each other by wrapping individually. Bramleys and Cox's will keep until Easter stored like this. Onions can be strung up letting the air circulate round them. Janet

Great Yarmouth Food Bank report

The impact of the roll out of Universal Credit on the Borough has been severe. In 2016 the number of emergency food supplies handed out was 5,320. In 2017 from January to end of July 5,808 boxes were handed out. It is estimated that another 4000 will be given by the end of the year making a total of 9,800. It is estimated one unit or supply of food costs $\pounds 15$ and is expected to last 3-4 days. Thus the cost to the town has been £79,000 in 2016 and likely to be £147,120 in 2017 (based on how much it would cost if we didn't have the food items donated). The top reasons for seeking help were I) Universal Credit [UC] problems; 2) Food Poverty (i.e. unable to manage on the reduced income or paying off the debts accrued while sorting UC); 3) a sudden crisis such as a death, redundancy, loss of earnings due to illness down to zero hours. About a third of the emergency food supplies involved children. The Foodbank has been working hard to assist people with the adverse side-effects on people claiming. We welcome the willingness of the Department for Work & Pensions to work with us and the frontline agencies in the town. This has led to early help where more information and support has been made available. Harvest Festivals are providing a large part of the food at the moment but this will soon fade during October. May I take the opportunity to thank all our community supporters who faithfully donate food into the local shops and Co-ops. Most of all a big thank you to those volunteers who transport the food to Gt Yarmouth faithfully every fortnight. Liz Townson Trustee

(Note: Great Yarmouth has been a pilot area for the introduction of Universal Credit. Unlike the benefits it replaces, UC is paid monthly in arrears, leading to a six-week period without any money coming in; longer if there are problems). Local Collection points are Acle Co-op, Freethorpe and Reedham Post Offices.

Proposal for a Churchyard Management Group

Reedham Churchyard is both large and old and is a beautiful area. For many years church members and their friends maintained the churchyard, but now Reedham Church has a smaller and older congregation who can no longer keep the churchyard maintained.

Thanks to the generosity of Reedham Parish Council, we are able to have professional assistance but, with such a large area of churchyard, more needs to be done. We have established some conservation areas in the oldest part of the churchyard which has helped, but there is still not enough done to keep the churchyard maintained.

I know that many villagers do tend the areas around family graves and also that many in the community want the churchyard to be maintained to a good standard.

What I am proposing is that a group of interested people in the community will get together to look at how the churchyard could be managed by a group of volunteers without taking too much of anyone's time and effort. This group would work with myself and Parochial Church Council (PCC) members to look at what could be achieved within the limitations of the Diocesan Guidance for Churchyards.
