From the (Reedham) Rectory

I don't think I can truthfully call myself a sports person. Yes, I love to go to the occasional Norwich match and I find being 'at the match' really good fun. There is something especially enjoyable about sitting with other Norwich City fans and shouting and jumping up and down – but one can hardly call that exercise. Walking is perhaps the most energetic thing I do but, this week, I have been an avid sports watcher.

The Olympics has been a real triumph for Britain which, as I write this, stands second in the medals table. The success of our sportsmen and women has been such a breath of fresh air and encouragement after the difficulties of the referendum and the political turmoil in our country. There has been real team spirit this year among the competitors. Louis Smith, the gymnast, was disappointed when he did not win gold but sincerely congratulated his team mate even so. Mo Farah, after his great win, wanted only to talk about his family and how he had managed to continue on after his fall so that his daughter would be proud of him.

I was interested to learn that we had a Christian Chaplain to the teams in Rio, Jules Wilkinson. In her internet blog she said of a bible study she did with some of our athletes: 'We looked at how amazing it is to be a child of God and how nothing on earth compares to being called that.'

Many of the sportsmen and women competing this year from all over the world are really proud of their Christian faith. Richard Chambers, a member of the Great Britain rowing team said that his faith doesn't always make his life as an athlete easy, but he's resolutely committed to it anyway: "I'm a Christian in the rowing team and that's how I want to be recognised. Being a Christian in Team GB has its difficulties but knowing God is always there supporting and helping me is great."

Usain Bolt, the brilliant runner who has done so much for sport, is first and foremost a Christian. After each victory, he publicly gives thanks to God and when he won the 200m race at London 2012, he said of his Lord and Saviour: 'Nothing would have been possible without Him.'

Another gold medal winner who is not so well known is Leone Nakarawa of the Fijian Rugby team which beat Great Britain in the final at the Deodor Stadium in Rio. This was the first Olympic medal Fiji ever won. Leone is one of the more outspoken Christians in the team who pray and study the Bible together as part of their training and preparations. "We Fijians don't have large facilities like other teams have," he said last year as he prepared for the World Cup; "But we know that being here is not from our strength but from God and it is all God's plan. Even if we lose we know that there is something bigger."

Most Christians are not sportsmen and women, most are like me and couldn't even do well in the Mum's race at school sports days. Even so the Bible, in the Letter to the Hebrews, says: 'let us run with endurance the race that is set before us', and as we go through life it does sometimes feel like a tough race. Christians acknowledge that and realise that, however hard life gets, it is important to keep your eyes on the Lord and carry on.

Norfolk - united against abuse

In Norfolk, 2,709 safeguarding adult concerns were raised between April 2015 and March 2016. In England there are over 100,000 cases reported of adults being abused each year. Most often the abuse is carried out by someone known to the person who is being harmed.

In our local parish, we probably know someone who needs help with their money, to pay their bills or for shopping, or support to get around or carry out daily tasks. Often there is a formal or informal arrangement in place with social services, a care home, carer, friend or relative. Sometimes, though, things may go wrong. The person needing support may feel uncomfortable, afraid or hurt in the situation, or find their money or possessions are being taken from them.

Adults can suffer from all sorts of abuse. As well as physical, emotional and sexual abuse, people can experience financial abuse – when people take money or belongings without asking. People can be neglected, when people who are there to help do not look after people properly or neglect themselves to extent that this puts them at risk.

The individual causing the harm may be a stranger, but as the statistics show, more often than not it is someone they know and usually feel safe with, often in a position of trust and power, such as a health or care professional, a family member or relative or neighbour.

But everyone has a right to feel safe, to make their own decisions and to be respected and listened to, and live free from abuse or neglect.

So look out for the signs of abuse. These can include someone who looks dirty, is not dressed properly or has an injury that is difficult to explain. Other signs can include someone who seems frightened around certain people, seems unusually down or withdrawn or who finds money missing

Trust your instinct – if something doesn't feel right, it probably isn't. Even if you're not sure whether these signs mean abuse, you should still report them to Norfolk Social Services. You can report your concern anonymously, but please give us as much information as possible so that we can follow it up.

Our flowers have really taken a battering with the strong winds, heavy rain and strong sunshine during August. If they are dead-headed, trimmed, fed and kept watered they will still give us some colour until the frosts come. It is a good time to take cuttings of geraniums, fuschias etc. Take off a non-flowering shoot, about 2-3" long, put round the edge of a pot and keep in the shade. Spring flowering bulbs can be chosen for planting or for Christmas presents.

Vegetables are plentiful now and, as beans etc. finish, spring cabbages and cauliflowers can be planted out. Salad leaves can be sown for a quick crop.
