Christian faith can express itself most authentically in the most challenging of situations: paying attention to that can be inspiring for those of us who witness in more comfortable surroundings.

That led to me paying two visits to Northern Ireland when I was in my twenties. In those days the sectarian struggle, with its religious division between Catholic and Protestant, was sometimes cited by opponents of Christian faith: *Just look at Northern Ireland...*. On my first trip I was touring Ireland using my privilege train pass: at a formational time in my life, I was curious to see how followers of Jesus might be responding to the sectarian divide. It was during a lull in the Troubles, although the Good Friday Agreement was still years away. I was pleasantly surprised to find that I'd arrived in (London)Derry on the weekend of an ecumenical festival! Following a united service in the Church of Ireland cathedral, I was invited for tea by a Roman Catholic family, who made me very welcome and explained the Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament I'd stumbled upon in a RC church the previous day. These good Christian relationships on the ground gave me hope for Northern Ireland's future, despite the partisan murals and the oppressive feel of the security defences.

I left them to make my way along the beautiful Antrim coast. Apart from the Giant's Causeway (which wasn't as giant as I'd imagined it to be!) and Rathlin Island (as seen on BBC *Springwatch*) I wanted to drop in on the Corrymeela Community's residential centre, having previously heard about it on a radio programme. This ecumenical, dispersed community of Christians operates two bases, in Belfast and outside Ballycastle, and specialises in providing support to, and bringing together, people from opposite sides of the divide, in safe surroundings. These might be politicians, or single mothers and their children from urban estates. Enjoying the hospitality and activities, they had the opportunity to associate with those they might normally shun and find that they faced similar challenges. My second trip was to do a two-week stint as a volunteer at the centre: a place where Christianity was being truly practised, rather than used as a sectarian label.

Although better times have come in Northern Ireland, Corrymeela's work continues, although I no longer follow it. These days, for similar inspiration, I would look to Christians in the Middle East. Here the tragic religious divide is between faiths, rather than denominations, while Christians are only a minority. UK charity *Embrace the Middle East* shows me that local Christians are responding to the serious challenges of living in the region by providing love and practical support to all in need, irrespective of national or religious identity. That might be working in Lebanon with young Syrian refugees traumatised by

violence; in Egypt with women with limited education; or with those in desperate need of healthcare in Gaza. In the latter case, one has to be impressed by the courage and determination shown by *Embrace*'s partners to keep hospitals and clinics going, even when services have been disrupted or facilities destroyed by Israeli action.

It is encouraging and inspiring to know that, through his followers, Jesus continues to meet division and oppression with steadfast love, not least in the land where he walked.

Reedham Churchyard Volunteers

Thank you to the volunteers who turned up in June to help tidy up the churchyard. We tackled a thicket of alexanders.

Alexanders, or Allsanders, are an edible flowering plant that grows on waste ground and in hedges around the Mediterranean and Atlantic coastal regions of Europe. It is often found close to the sites of medieval herb gardens and other historic places since it was grown as a pot herb. Perhaps our plants even owe their origin to the Romans who it is believed once had a structure where the church now stands. The young stems can be cooked like asparagus and it is one of the few fresh plants that can be eaten in February and March. The young shoots and leaves are also edible as well as the roots (not to be mistaken for hemlock which has a white flower and is poisonous). Alexanders fell out of favour in the 18th century after celery started to be mass produced and now only appears as an exotic "foraged" food in posh restaurants. The flowers are fragrant and visited by a wide variety of insects, but it is possible to have too much of a good thing and the plants were taking over.

Now much of them have been cut back allowing other, perhaps less dominant, plants to find a footbold.

The next date for the churchyard group will be **towards the end of July –** date to be confirmed nearer the time. This is because we don't yet know when the 'Conservation Mow' by the Bure Valley Conservation Group is likely to take place.

Please come and help if you have an hour or two to spare. It is a lovely, tranquil space and needs looking after.

REEDHAM PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting held on Monday 2^{nd} June 2025 in the Village Hall There were 8 Councillors present, the Clerk, District Councillor Nurden and 8 members of the public. The meeting commenced at $7.30\,\mathrm{pm}$.

The Clerk gave the following updates:

A bleed control kit has been put in the Riverside defibrillator cabinet and registered with the ambulance service.

Following a request from a resident, new dog fouling stickers have been attached to the planters on Riverside.

The Clerk also passed round a photo of signage delivered to the Reedham Quay Ranger today, 2nd June, giving details of mooring charges for the quay which are due to start immediately.

Cllr Nurden informed the Council that the election for a District Councillor for the Acle Ward had been won by the Reform candidate.

There is now a vacancy on the Parish Council. Elections at Broadland District Council have been notified and issued the Casual Vacancy notice. Application forms available from the Clerk.

A representative from Reedham School gave an update on behalf of the Head, Beth Spaul:

A meeting has been held with the CEO of the Consortium Trust about replacing or updating the school swimming pool. It is planned within the next 18 months to 2 years to either extend the pool, move it to another area within the school playground, or demolish it and pupils will attend swimming lessons at another facility in the area. The consensus is for the school to extend and refurbish the pool, and then to make this available for public hire; this would cost around £350,000. The school are considering a swimming pool working group to raise funds.

The Parish Council are continuing with their efforts to clean and replace the tourist signs along Riverside. Cllr Mutten has checked the maps and the Perspex needs replacing on both signs. One map also needs replacing, the Council were advised that the cost of replacement should be less than £100.

The Clerk has received a quote of £225 + VAT for repairs to the slabs in front of the Millenium bench at the junction of New Road and Mill Road. The Council approved this cost for the works to go ahead.

In May the speed sensor was located on Station Road near the junction with Barn Owl Close, facing North collecting data from traffic entering the village. The speed limit here is 30mph.

The 85th percentile was 28 mph; the average speed was 21.5 mph. The average vehicles per day was 456. The number of vehicles per day is comparable to the data last collected at this location in November 2023.
