From the Rectory

As I write, Chancellor Rachel Reeves has been criticised by the BBC for making rather too much of her $5\frac{1}{2}$ years with the Bank of England – according to one speech, 'the best part of a decade.'

If we've ever been coached in the art of writing a CV, we were probably told to make the most of the experience we've amassed and what we have to offer. The beginning of Lent (Ash Wednesday: this year, 5th March) seems to ask for the reverse assessment of our condition and potential: 'Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return.' But then we aren't coming to God seeking a position, but to foster a relationship. When St. Paul, speaking ironically to the Philippians, presents his credentials according to the worldly standards of his religion (his Jewish birthright, circumcision, zeal for the law) he quickly says he now counts them all as rubbish, compared to the surpassing greatness of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. [3.8] When he does something similar to counter his opponents in Corinth [2Cor 11] he swiftly shifts to boasting about the sufferings he has endured in his mission as an apostle. We might exaggerate to cover up our perceived vulnerabilities: Paul chooses to parade them. But, as he wrote in his first letter to them [ICor I.26ff] God has a track record of choosing what the world judges as foolish, weak, lowly or despised, in order to undermine worldly status - that noone may boast before him. In her Magnificat, Mary celebrated both God's putting down of the mighty and his exalting of the humble: just as God seeks to dissuade us from thinking or making more of ourselves than we should, he also acts to prevent us, or anybody else, making less of us than we might.

The truth is, of course, that God knows us as we truly are. There's no pulling the wool over his eyes, as we might seek to do with others, or, for that matter, ourselves. He can spot false humility as easily as overblown pride. Keeping up those pretences, maintaining those masks can take a lot of energy: there is something liberating about discovering that we are loved – just that, loved. Not for who we are; maybe despite who we are. Ask the woman who anointed Jesus' feet, or Zacchaeus, the tax-collector.

Maybe God sees in us his own likeness [Genesis 1.26]; or the likeness of his Son. Paul taught the Corinthians that the face of Jesus Christ displays the glory of God [2Cor 4.6]; and that we too, as we are changed into his likeness, reflect that same glory [3.18]. Dust we are; but, in the light of God, we can be glorious dust – like particles in the air revealing a shaft of sunlight. When James and John came to Jesus seeking a position (to the immediate right and left of Jesus in his kingdom) Jesus referred them to the way of the cross (Can you drink the cup that I drink?) The hymn in Philippians 2 affirms that, for Jesus, this was the route to exaltation by way of humility and humiliation. We seek to walk with him, that it may be for us our curriculum (course) vitae (of life).

Reedham Church Building – News!

All Reedham School Children have been told about the Roman Pharos, or Lighthouse, at Reedham Church. Archaeological investigations by a crack team from Reading University, headed by Prof. Mike Fulford CBE, took place between 2013 to 2018, with a lot of postexcavation research taking place since. The results have now been published and can be read on-line -

This concludes that Reedham was indeed the site of a Roman defended Watchtower or Fortlet, the materials being used over the following centuries in the construction and expansion of the church building. What to me is equally exciting is that a mortar floor and the remains of a rectangular structure was discovered just to the north of the 'herringbone wall' which has been dated to mid-seventh to mid-eighth century. It seems to be part of the original church founded by St Felix, who was the first Bishop of East Anglia from c.630 – 648.

The March edition of 'Current Archaeology' has an article about the dig and Reedham Church features on the front cover. I'll leave a copy in Reedham church – but please don't take it away.
