After years of being asked What's the difference between a Vicar and a Rector?\* I can see I'm now going to have to prepare an answer to What's the difference between a Vicar/Rector and a Canon?

Having been installed as an Honorary Canon of Norwich Cathedral, it's now becoming clear what the role entails! The Honorary bit is certainly true, both in the sense of being unpaid (like Rural Dean!) and in that it expresses recognition of service. Thank you for adding to that with your messages of congratulation and endorsement – I appreciate them.

I've learnt that there are 24 ordained Honorary Canons, all in active ministry – including some locally familiar faces: Damon Rogers, Nick Garrard and Paul Cubitt, all formerly of this deanery; also former Bishop's Chaplain Susanna Gunner. There are also 12 lay canons (one, Claire Gilbert, was installed along with me) and ecumenical canons. Together we form the College of Canons, which is part of the formal Foundation of the cathedral, meeting 3 times per year and acting as a kind of consultative committee. We are not to be confused with the Residentiary Canons, who run the cathedral along with the Dean and the rest of the Chapter. That said, I may occasionally be invited to contribute to worship, most likely by preaching at Sunday Evensong.

Within the diocese I am asked to be an ambassador for the Cathedral. When he visited our deanery synod, Dean Andrew said that he considered the Cathedral's ministry complemented that of our parish churches. It exercises a very extensive ministry: daily worship; the mother church of the diocese (as when it hosted our clergy conference); ministry to the institutions and charities of the city and county; a centre for theology, history, art and science; a popular visitor attraction and an education centre for visiting schoolchildren. I will continue to pray for its ministry, but in a more informed way; as it prays for ours.

\* Under the former means of financing the clergy, Rectors received the full tithes – but also had responsibilities in relation to the upkeep of the chancel and providing for parishioners. But not all who were entitled to the tithes wanted to or were in a position to do the actual work of a parish priest: they would employ a Vicar to do that (vicariously) paying him a lesser share of the income. Memorials in All Saints, Freethorpe declare that Lord of the Manor Richard Vade Walpole was the 'impropriator of the great tithes' of the parish: I assume the resident clergyman was a vicar. At St. Edmund, Acle, a 17th century brass commemorates Thomas Stones, Rector of Acle (where he diligently ministered)

and of Wickmere (15 miles away) and 'parson of East Dereham' (over 25 **4.** miles away) – where, thankfully, there was a vicar to perform actual ministry! These days, Rector and Vicar are historical titles with no contemporary distinction – unless your benefice is presided over by a Team Ministry (e.g. Great Yarmouth, or Flegg) in which case the senior member and incumbent is the Team Rector and the other clergy, Team Vicars.



This is necessary for preparations for the evening event. The bonfire and firework display could be cancelled on the night, if strong winds or adverse weather condition, you will be advised of another date in the Mercury, Facebook, on notice boards and on the village halls web site <a href="https://www.reedhamvillagehall.co.uk">www.reedhamvillagehall.co.uk</a> The village hall will NOT allow any unsafe combustible items, e.g. mattresses, sofas, foam cushions, glass with or without frames, tyres, and plaster board, or any material that will give off harmful smoke into the atmosphere. You will also be limited on the size of tree branches or posts etc to 4" in diameter. We hope that you will understand that for Health and Safety and Environmental reasons why these measures have to be in place. Bonfire could be cancelled and given another date!

#### **REEDHAM PARISH COUNCIL**

10.

Meeting held on Monday 6th October 2025 in the Village Hall. There were ten Councillors present, the Clerk, District Councillor Nurden and eight members of the public.

The Clerk gave an update to the Council:

The Interpretation Panel has been installed and the slabs in front of the seat at the junction of New Road and Mill Road have been replaced.

The new Village Sign has been put in place – the installation has been paid for by an anonymous donation.

The Clerk also advised that Reedham Post Office will be permanently closed from Ipm on Wednesday 15th October.

Beth Spaul, Academy Head Reedham Primary & Nursery School, gave an update on the trial of new school hours. This will run for one academic year and is hoped to enhance teaching quality, pupil outcomes, and staff wellbeing.

Plans for the village Christmas tree are going well. Cllr George gave the Council a

comprehensive report and confirmed that the Working Group are proposing the
following:
☐ A 15ft tree located on The Nelson car park, supported by a frame and sandbags.
☐ Approaching local businesses for sponsorship.
☐ Applying to Broadland District Council for permission to power mains lighting from
the Quay Rangers hut on Riverside.
☐ School to be invited to decorate eco-friendly baubles for the tree.
☐ Three events in December, held on Thursdays, around the Christmas Tree.
The Council approved all the proposals.

An allotments inspection was carried out in September; most plots are in good condition. One plot changed hands on 1st October, there are still 7 people from Reedham on the waiting list. A new noticeboard is being delivered and installed in October. The allotments AGM has been arranged for 23<sup>rd</sup> October, all plot holders are invited to attend.

The Council approved an estimate of £380 to repaint the railings at the War Memorial, this will be done before the Remembrance Service on Sunday 9th November.

The new bollards have been installed on Middle Hill, this closes the road to through traffic, apart from cycles, making the road safer for pedestrians.

In September the speed sensor was located on Mill Road, facing North, near the junction with The Hills and Holly Farm Road, collecting data from traffic coming towards the school. The speed limit here is 30mph. The 85th percentile was 27.2 mph; the average speed was 21.5 mph. The average vehicles per day was 287.

The next scheduled meeting of the Parish Council is Monday 3rd November at 7.30pm, in the Village Hall lounge. Further details will be published on the website, Facebook page and notice board by the Doctors nearer the time. All parishioners are welcome to attend.

Bure Valley Conservation Group is delighted to have received a 2025 award from Norfolk Biodiversity Partnership. Initiated by Norfolk Wildlife Trust and based in Acle, the group became independent in 2015. Every Wednesday morning, roughly 20 of its members assemble somewhere to perform practical conservation work to benefit local wildlife and make it accessible to local communities. 
