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From the Rectory

Thank you to all those who made it possible for me to take a sabbatical during May, June & July: I very much enjoyed it. One of my intentions was to bring together two important aspects of my life: my faith and my love of nature – which, as a Christian, I see as God's creation. That doesn't mean that I don't believe in evolution: there is plenty of evidence of that in the wildlife I study. I don't think God designed all the wonderful creatures I see, in the sense of mapping them out on a drawing board. As Richard Dawkins observed (I've done a little reading as well) you only have to look at a flatfish to see that. Rather, God expressed his design, his intention, in creating a world in which life can evolve. Genesis 1 compresses down to six days an amazing, ongoing process. In the beginning, it states, the earth was without form and void. In contrast, God's intention was and is to create a world filled with an abundant (no longer void) diversity (no longer without form) of life.

During my sabbatical I focussed particularly on insects in churchyards. If you look at the small things, a churchyard (or garden) is large enough to present us with a microcosm of creation. The best churchyards are managed with wildlife in mind; but even in unpromising settings there are usually things to find around the edges, or in niches – like graves with kerbs, where the mower doesn't reach. David Attenborough has become a national hero for his television programmes featuring the amazing wildlife of our planet; but there is something similar going on, in miniature, all around us. Robberflies were the big cats of my churchyard safaris. Aphids were the abundant food source attracting a diversity of predators. Mimics tried to avoid being eaten by pretending to be something dangerous; tortoise beetle larvae concealed themselves under their own droppings. A Wool Carder Bee was defending his territory in urban Kings Lynn; not far away, leafcutter bees were nesting in a pot of faded artificial flowers. I saw Malachite Beetles kissing (I thought they were fighting, like stags) and zombie ladybirds (a mystery solved by watching an episode of Springwatch). I saw species I'd not seen before. I even found what is potentially a species of fly not previously recorded in Britain: not in some Broadland fen or other specialist habitat, but in Blofield churchyard, just down the road!

It shows just how much there is that we overlook in our own backyard. And how much that we need to hold on to. Churchyards are special because, unlike most of our crowded island, they've escaped being concreted over, or intensively farmed. But they are, of course, subject to external pressures. By July, insects (other than grasshoppers) were hard to find in the dried-up swards: climate breakdown is now biting. We need to do so much more to slow its progress. During my sabbatical I agreed to become an Eco-chaplain within the

Diocese, when I come to the end of my term as Rural Dean. I'd like to encourage churches to do what they can and to encourage others in their communities. We have an excellent example locally at Hemblington; and Reedham in this benefice. 4.

God's design is to create a world filled with an abundant diversity of life. At the moment humanity is guilty of heading in the opposite direction.

Parish Notes

The Church of England has a new Festival in its calendar: that of Creation in Christ. Ecumenical Patriarch Demetrios I introduced the idea of marking Creationtide between 1st September and 4th October (St. Francis) and other denominations, including the Church of England, responded positively. Since 2000 we have had creation readings set for the 2nd Sunday before Lent; now Creationtide has been given an official festival on the first Sunday of September. However, this year we will be marking it a week early, at the Freethorpe Area Churches Together Joint Holy Communion on 30th August at All Saints, Freethorpe (10.30am). This is also a Benefice Service, thus maximising the number of people who are free to attend. The Rector will be referring to his sabbatical and will have some of his churchyard insect photos on display. (It is recognised that some people will be reading this after that date; but the sermon will be on our website).

We have swapped a couple of services at Beighton: 13th September will be Harvest Holy Communion, 11th October Morning Worship.

Harvest Thanksgiving will be marked at Beighton on 13th, Reedham on 20th September, Freethorpe on 27th September, Wickhampton on 4th October and Acle on 18th October. (There may be celebrations at other churches, yet to be scheduled).

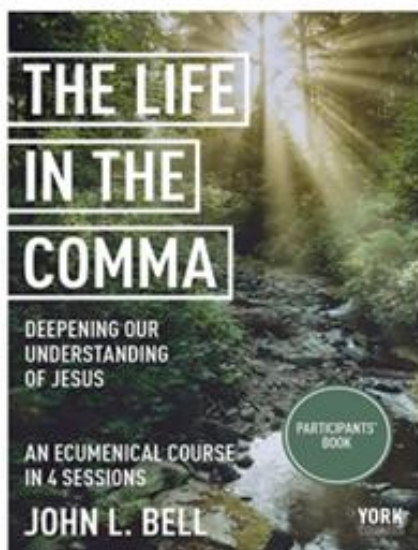

Several people have commented that I had 'good weather' for my sabbatical. Given my concern for the environment and its inhabitants, I just can't call July's successive heat waves, with almost zero rain, 'good weather'.

I recently attended a screening of the People's Emergency Briefing organised by Hemblington Church: a 50-minute film presented by Chris Packham, giving a condensed version of the National Emergency Briefing held in Westminster last November. In it, scientists and other leaders in their field (including professors from UCL, Oxford, and other mainstream Universities and a former British Army Lt General) express their realistic fears of the possible, even probable effects of climate breakdown on British and human society, in an attempt to trigger a meaningful national response (www.nebriefing.org/expert-briefings).

There is a campaign to get the film shown on network TV: something politicians appear to be resisting – perhaps because accepting even a proportion of its contents would shatter the illusion that they have circumstances under control, and severely question the relevance of much of what they are concentrating on (the phrase deckchairs on the Titanic comes to mind). Some of the content was familiar to me; other elements were new.

Three things in particular stayed with me:

- human society has developed during an era when the climate has been remarkably stable; human activity since the industrial revolution means that we are now leaving that and entering uncharted territory for our species.
- we might be tempted to think that getting a couple of degrees warmer would be a pleasant outcome in the British Isles; but, apart from the certainty that we would be impacted by catastrophic changes elsewhere, there is a realistic possibility that disruption of ocean currents could turn the climate here inhospitably cold, with severe effects on food production, for example.
- that despite the deeply disturbing predictions, there is still hope: it is still possible to avoid the worst, if there is the political will to do so – hence the campaign.

Bishop Graham has said:

"We are the first generation to see the effects of climate change and the last that can do anything about it. The People's Emergency Briefing is a wake-up call for all of us."

There were a few others from Acle and maybe elsewhere in the benefice at the screening: it would be great to give it wider local coverage. Please get in touch if you are interested in helping to stage a local screening.
